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May Calendar Memorial Weekend Sunstone Outing In Plush Oregon. May 28,29,30,31,

We will be camping on the BLM area. This is a no fee Sunstone area. There is a restroom but no water. So bring plenty. Saturday night will be "The Potluck" bring a dish to share that will feed five. The club will be providing Hotdogs and Hamburgers, and all the condiments. We will be mining at the "Dust Devil Mine "Most stones are free but colored stones may cost \$\$\$. The Dust Devil Mine is about 1 mile from the camp area. Bring plenty of water to drink and sun screen. Tools: Hammer, Small Pick, Shovel, Small Prybar, A bucket for your sunstones. Ted made a Classifying Screen last year. The Mine provided shaker tables on a first come first serve.


Directions to Plush from Lakeview:

Drive North about 6 miles Turn Right on Hwy 140. This intersection is well marked for the Warner Mt Ski area and Adel. Drive 16 miles east on Hwy. 140, Then turn left on CR 3-13 toward Plush. This intersection is well marked for Plush, Where you should top off your fuel tank and pick up ice. Beverages and snacks before continuing north on CR 3-10 also known as Hogback Road. It is the main roads running through Plush. The pavement will end after 5.5 miles. Drive another 5.5 miles to the intersection with CR 3-11 and turn right Go ½ mile and turn left at the intersection with BLM 6155, Which is marked by a decaying sigh that once read SUNSTONE. Drive 7 miles and turn left at the intersection with BLM 6115 which is well marked by a sign pointing this way to the Sunstone Collecting area.

Coming From the North On 395

When traveling from the north on Hwy 395, turn left on Hogback Rd. Milepost 64. During dry weather with high clearance vehicles turn left after 7 miles on unmarked Nasty Flat Rd. Drive 7 ¼ miles then right on BLM 6115. In wet weather or in low ground clearance vehicles travel about 20 miles south on Hogback Rd. then left on cr-3-11. Then left at the intersection with BLM 6155 and left again at the intersection with BLM 6115. Travel 5 miles to the mine.

I'm going to head on down to Arizona the week before Ted, Tom and Dan and beat those old pros out of all there gold nuggets. He! He! Heeeeeeeeeee!.

Oh, of course, one very minor problem was observed at the Brooks outing. It goes like this: Ouida, "What's Joe doing over there leaning against the side of his truck and reading something?" Claudia, "He's reading the manual to figure out how to operate the metal detector!" Ouida replied, "Don't you think he should have done that before he got here?" Well! What do those girls know anyway????

Monday morning February 23, the truck was all packed with camping and metal detecting gear, and I was on my way. I hit the road early and by 6 pm. I was eating the dinner special in the casino restaurant at Bordertown, Nevada. I was feeling real good after dinner so I got back on the road and had an easy drive through Reno. I headed east through Fernley and Fallon, NV, then south on Highway 95. I knew there were campgrounds at Walker Lake so that was where I headed. I arrived at the lake about 9:30 to 10 pm. It was cool but not uncomfortable. When I awoke at sunrise it was somewhere in the 20 degree range. Pretty chilly! The mountains to the west were all covered with snow.

The sunrise coming up over Walker Lake was beautiful. After a couple of bowls of cereal I headed south. I arrived at Beatty about 1:45 pm. and fueled the truck. Then I wandered over to the casino restaurant and fueled myself. I arrived in Las Vegas at rush hour. That was fun! But, I pushed on through. I didn't want to mess with security at Hoover Dam so I stayed on Highway 95 which turns south just west of Boulder City. When I arrived



at Laughlin the sun had already set. I pushed on through Kingman to Highway 93 which I traveled until I reached Wikieup. Spent the night there then pushed off south early the next morning. Cruised through Wickenburg around 10 am. and arrived in Morristown 15-20 minutes later. It was 10:30 and I was on Castle Hot Springs Road and heading north into the desert. My destination was the Roadrunner Prospecting Club of Arizona claims north of Morristown. The claims were in-and-around the San Domingo Wash, Ox Wash and the Little San Domingo wash. They consist of 21 contiguous claims and 5 additional GPAA claims that interlock with them on the north side.

I headed first into the Little San Domingo Wash. Drove into the wash about a half mile and came to a rock wall. So, I decided to backtrack and head on over to the far Northwest corner of the claims and start there. The roads were great in many places then you would come upon spots that it would be best traveled with high clearance vehicle. I arrived at the Carrie #4 claim and set up camp, turned on and ground balanced my Whites Gold Master II metal detector and headed out to the northeast. I immediately dropped down into a small wash and it was soon obvious there had been a lot of dry washing going on there. There were holes and piles of material everywhere. Immediately I started hitting targets. I must have been near an old camp site. I found some lovely old rusted soup cans, and pieces of rusted tin of every imaginable size. I soon became tired of digging rust. There wasn't a bench along this part of the wash so,

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I headed up the side of the nearby hill. I was not finding anything in the way of metals but, the ground did give up some pretty quartz crystals. I circled around to the northeast and back south to camp. Along the way I picked up a few bullets and shell casings.

Late in the day my 1:4, 1:40 ground balance potentiometer didn't seem to feel right when I was adjusting the ground balance. To make the story short, all 3 wires were broken off of the fine tuning pot because it had come loose from the housing and the wires had been moving at the solder joints during ground balance.

So! There I had 3 colored wires broken loose and no idea which color went on which attachment point. I headed out of the desert and into Chandler, about an hour and 45 minute drive. I called Whites Electronics and spoke to Steve Hanson. He found out which colored wire attached where so I could make my own repairs. CAN YOU BELIEVE THIS!!! My son-in-law does not own a soldering iron. Well, I am sure Radio Shack was dying for my business. After repairing my metal detector I spent the night with the family.

The next morning I was on my way to Morristown. I set up camp at the same place on Carrie #4, ground balanced my detector, and headed up the "hill" to the west. I heard there was a wash with a nice wide bench over there. It is not clear on this photo where I camped look for a white spot Above the handle of the metal detector and between the saguaro and the bush. See



the black area about 200 to 300 feet below where I was standing? And I thought all deserts were flat (just like the earth. Right?). I found with metal detecting a person can spend a long time swinging the darn think and not hearing any targets. Being an amateur I do not yet trust that I have my detector set correctly. Can you imagine, after a long period without hitting a target, how excited I was to find a lead bullet! Well, the gods did not look down kindly on me. NO GOLD! Can you believe that?

But I had a great time, good weather, and beautiful country to roam in. I did not come home empty handed though. I brought back a lot of interesting "stuff".
